




Illustration 10: Vancouver Aquarium




Illustration 19: The robots & the track




Illustration 20: One of the Hockey Robots

Inside the RobuCup project I was working on two modules: the first was the Archive module, the second was the Internet module. The purpose of the Archive module is to store the data about the robots, in both the Simulation, Internet and the Real Time game, and then retrieve these data, so the player or the developer can look at these numbers and help to make the other parts of the project better or just re-see the game. The user can see the data from each robot and parallel with these numbers a video as well. The objective of the Internet module is to realize the control and coordination of the robots with the help of the Internet. In the first version, the home team will be controlled by the Decision Module and the enemy team will be controlled over the Internet with the help of a keyboard. In a later version, both teams could be controlled by two different computers and the data will be sent over the Internet.

I loved working on this project, because we worked in a real international team. It was very useful because I learned a lot of new stuff and I could horn my teamwork skills.

I would like to a moment to thank professors Dr. Márton Lőrinc and Dr. Shahram Payandeh for giving and helping me in a great experience, which I will remember forever.
